SPLC calls on president elect to reject bigotry

In the winter issue of the Southern Poverty Law Center Report, the newspaper has an article on fighting hate. At press time the organization had 182,000 people sign a petition urging the President elect, to "distance himself and his office" from hate organizations. The article further states that during his campaign, he denigrated people on the basis of gender, race, disability, religion and other diversity factors. 

Application Instructions:

Please complete the attached application form to apply for the MMC/NAME Scholarship and submit it by April 1, 2017. Mail application packet to: MMC/NAME Scholarship Committee at P.O. Box 738 Columbia, MD 21045. Scholarship applicants will be notified of the decision in June 1, 2017.

Requirements for **High School** Applicant:

- Must be a resident of Maryland
- Must have 3.4 GPA or higher
- Must be eligible to graduate in June, of the year of application
- Proof of acceptance in a 2 or 4-year undergraduate program
- Must intend to teach P-12 upon completion of an undergraduate program
- Attach copy of your **official** transcript
- You must show a copy of your school bill in order to receive your monetary scholarship
- You must include in your packet two letters of recommendations. One recommendation must be personal and the other recommendation must be school related.

Requirements for Undergraduate College Applicant:

- Must be a resident of Maryland
- Must be a current undergraduate student in one of Maryland's colleges or universities
- Must have a 3.5 cumulative average
- Must intend to teach P-12 upon completion of an undergraduate program
- Attach copy of official transcript
- You must include in your packet two letters of recommendations. One recommendation must be personal and the other recommendation must be school related.

Two letters of reference
Applications that are not complete, will not be reviewed. All materials must be submitted or postmarked no later than April 1, to be reviewed. All candidates will be notified by June 1.
Once you have been awarded the scholarship, you will be asked for proof of registration for the upcoming school year. Your scholarship will be sent directly to the University in August.


