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#### Jack Epstein Award 2017

The Maryland Multicultural Coalition/Chapter of NAME (MMC/NAME) presents an award each spring at its annual statewide conference. This year the conference will be held in Howard County on April 22, 2017.

The award will recognize exemplary commitment to Education that is Multicultural in Maryland. Nominees may be educators or others who are dedicated to creating educational environments in which all people are valued equally and where all are inspired to work together in schools and communities. Outstanding examples of multicultural activities, programs or multiculturalism in an educational setting may also be nominated for recognition.

#### **MMC CRITERIA**

Nominees may include (but need no be limited to) teachers, support personnel, volunteers, counselors, administrators, specialists, coordinators, directors, and community activists. Nominees may work in public or private organizations and must live or work in Maryland. Members of the MMC/NAME Executive Board may not be nominated.

Only one nominator is required for each nomination. Anyone may make a nomination, whether the nominator is a NAME member or not. All nomination forms must bear the signature of the person making the nomination along with his/her home address, day and evening phone numbers, and email address.

Completed nomination forms and supporting documents are to be mailed to MMC/NAME, P O Box 738, Columbia, MD 21045. Nominations must be postmarked or delivered no later than March 1, 2017.

Each nomination must include as supporting documents:

One letter of support. (Additional letters of support may be included.)

A brief biographical sketch of the individual or overview of the program.

Materials from projects, newspaper clippings and other support material may be submitted. Support material should relate to the reasons the nominee is being nominated. The MMC/NAME Executive Board may solicit additional information if it is deemed necessary. The nomination form and support materials will become the property of MMC/NAME.

The final decision on awards to be presented will be made by the MMC/NAME Executive Board. The Executive Board may appoint a sub-committee to review nominations and make recommendations to the Board for a final decision.

The award will be in the form of a certificate from MMC/NAME, recognition at the MMC/NAME Annual Conference and in the pages of the MMC/NAME newsletter, *VOICES*.





#### MARYLAND ARTIST JOYCE J. SCOTT IS HONORED NATIONALLY

Joyce J. Scott of Baltimore was recently named one of 23 individuals in the nation awarded with a 2016 MacArthur Foundation Fellowship. The \$625,000 fellowship is presented annually to "extraordinary individuals" as a "genius grant" for outstanding work and contributions in their fields. The awards are presented as a surprise to the recipients in the hope that their great work will continue with a boost from this windfall.

Self-described as a visual and performing artist, Joyce notes that for more that 40 years she has always imagined the possibilities and techniques of beadwork, creating large sculptures, jewelry, and wall hangings. She is currently designing an outdoor installment paying tribute to Harriet Tubman. Her mother, Elizabeth Talford Scott, was also a nationally recognized artist, especially known for her textiles and quilts. Honored to be awarded a MacArthur Grant, she states that she plans to keep "living a creative life:" and continue her stressing themes of politics, racism, and humanism.

# NWHP Announces the 2017 Theme and Honorees "Honoring Trailblazing Women in Labor and Business"

The 2017 theme for National Women's History Month honors women who have successfully challenged the role of women in both business and the paid labor force. Women have always worked, but often their work has been undervalued and unpaid.

The 2017 Honorees represent many diverse backgrounds and each made her mark in a different field.

Additionally, the Honorees' work and influence spans three centuries of America's history. These women all successfully challenged the social and legal structures that have kept women's labor underappreciated and underpaid.

Facing stark inequalities in the workplace (lower wages, poor working conditions, and limited opportunities), they fought to make the workplace a less hostile environment for women. They succeeded in expanding women's participation in commerce and their power in the paid labor force. As labor and business leaders and innovators they defied the social mores of their times by demonstrating women's ability to create organizations and establish their own businesses that paved the way for better working conditions and wages for themselves and other women.

They proved that women could succeed in every field. While each Honoree is extraordinary, each is also ordinary in her own way, proving that women business and labor leaders can and should be considered the norm. Most importantly, the 2017 Honorees paved the way for generations of women labor and business leaders to follow.



National Museum of African American History and Culture Top 10 Things To Know About Visiting the Museum

We have opened our doors to the public and we couldn't be more excited to share with you all <u>#APeoplesJourney</u>! Before you pack your bags, grab your comfortable walking shoes, and make a trip to the National Mall to visit the museum, there are a few things you need to know to make your experience even more enjoyable.

- 1. You must have a <u>Timed Pass</u> to enter the Museum. Entrance to the Museum begins on the Constitution Ave side of the building.
- 2. A limited number of Same Day Timed Passes will be available daily at the Museum beginning at 9:15 a.m.
- 3. Please do not arrive prior to the time on your pass, it will not speed up your entry. Only current-hour Timed Passes will be allowed to enter the queue.
- 4. Wear comfortable shoes during your visit.
- 5. Use public transportation instead of driving. Go to the <u>WMATA.com</u> to get the most up-to-date information about metro and buses. If you must drive, see <u>parking options</u>.
- 6. Expect to pass through a security screening. Avoid bringing large bags to get through security screens faster. See our <u>list of prohibited items</u>.



- 7. Be aware of counterfeit passes. Only passes obtained directly through the Museum's provider, Etix, will be honored. Timed Passes may only be used once.
- 8. Wheelchairs are limited and distributed on a first come first served basis. Please plan to bring your own if possible. The handicap accessible entrance to the Museum is located on the Constitution Ave side of the building.
- 9. Download the <u>NMAAHC Mobile</u> app as a complement to your onsite Museum experience.
- 10. We have keepsakes and gifts available at out Museum Shop and a variety of food choices at our Sweet Home Café. Expect long lines at both.

# LIGHT AND REFLECTION: THE NATIONAL MUSUEM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

While Congress passed legislation that launched the development of the National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) in 2003, it wasn't until September, 2016, that the new Smithsonian Museum was completed and opened. It is the only national museum devoted exclusively to the documentation of African American life, history, arts, and culture. It has been over 100 years that the idea for a memorial commemoration was generated to be shared with the hundreds of thousands of Washington D.C.'s annual yearly visitors that come from across the country and around the world and visit the National Mall

As the newest museum of the Smithsonian Institution, (NMAAHC) features a range of artifacts, well-researched and clear presentations of events, historical and contemporary, for all ages of visitors. Individuals such as Historical Maryland civil rights leaders and former slaves Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass are among the many featured in the Civil Rights section. This section explores the concept promoted by Douglass that "Power concedes nothing without a demand. It never did and never will."

The founding Director of the NMAAHC, Lonne Bunch III, notes that "The African American Experiences the lens through which we understand what it takes to be an American." Its many exhibits and 400,000 square feet of space focuses on a wide range of topics, including Slavery and Freedom, Era of Segregation, Music, the Arts, Entertainment and Culture, A Changing America since 1968. Special resources for educators, students, and visitors are moving and inspirational, and support the concept that Everyone Makes a Difference. A Theater and Food Gallery are also provided.

The Museum is located at 15<sup>th</sup> and Constitution Ave, NW, Washington DC, and is open daily from 10:00 a.m to 5:30 p.m. Admission is free, but here has been so much attendance since the Museum opened, it now requires a fixed time pass for entrance. This use of time passes will continue indefinitely. A few time passes are available at the entrance daily on a first come-first served basis.
